4. Please write a short statement on how your project supports the identified aims of Safer Roads Humber

The project aims to reduce the number of cycle collisions in Hull through the provision of bike lights and reflective wear. More specifically, this initiative will help to reduce the risk factors that contribute towards a collision. Recorded between 2018 – 2022, SRH statistics show that 2% of cyclists are involved in a collision due to defective bike lights. A further 3% of collisions were a result of riders wearing dark clothing. Collectively, 5% of cyclists are involved in a collision due to these contributory factors. See table below:

Recorded between 2018 – 2022 from October – January, SRH statistics indicates that 32.4% of cyclists are involved in a collision between the hours of 16:00 – 18:00. From October – January (2018-2022) 376 cyclists were injured in Hull, 123 of those injuries occurred in October, the

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month the clocks go back. In a typical week, cycle collisions are more common on weekdays than weekends. Between 2018 – 2022 a total of 318 cyclists were injured on a weekday (Mon-Fri) compared to 58 injuries on a weekend (Sat-Sun). These trends suggests that cycle collisions are more likely to occur on a weekday during peak commuting times, between the Autumn/Winter months when daylight hours are reduced.

5. Please provide an overview of your project, what you aim to do (outputs/objectives/timescales), how you will know if your project has been successful.

Our project is designed to promote road safety and reduce collisions by increasing the number of cyclists riding with bike lights and reflective wear in and around Hull. This will be achieved through the distribution and fitting of bike lights and high-vis ruck sack covers to poorly illuminated cyclists.

We will target busy roads across the cities network including; Springbank, Beverly/Clough road, Anlaby road, Freetown way, Holderness road and Mount Pleasant. Evidenced by Key Accident data recorded between 2018 – 2022, the % of collisions involving a cyclist are shown below:

Our approach is to issue lights and reflective wear to passing cyclists that are seen riding without lights and/or in poor visibility. Using intervention, practical advice and through the fitting of bike lights and distribution of ruck sack covers, we will increase the safety of those cyclists by improving their visibility to other road users and thereby reducing their risk as a vulnerable road user. We will measure the success of our initiative by evidencing the number of cyclists that were issued with the equipment.

More specifically, and in relation to the Mount Pleasant and Holderness Road junction, this initiative will act as a roadside education event, supporting the current <u>red light camera enforcement scheme</u>. Between 2019 – 2023, there have been a total of 6 collisions involving a cyclist at this junction, 5 of which occurred when daylight hours were reduced.

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7. Are there plans to continue the project once the grant fund is spent?

The aim is to continue the project in the Autumn/Winter period of 2025-2026, with a focus on local schools/business engagement. Delivered as part of our Modeshift STARS Education and Business travel plan programme, we will aim to support local schools and businesses through the provision of bike lights and high-vis ruck sack covers. This will help to ensure commuting cyclists, both pupils and employees, are "safe and seen" when cycling on the city's roads. We will aim to deliver the initiative through a series of on-site engagement events.

10. Treasury (impact on financial plan)

The uncommitted balance on the Safer Roads Humber reserve is £0.015m. The 2024-25 month 5 budget monitoring is forecasting an overspend of £0.281m. The final outturn position is uncertain and any increase in the overspend would need to be funded from the reserve. The PCC Fund has an uncommitted balance of £0.221m and bids would be subject to decision record approval from the OPCC.

11. Partnership manager (identify any risks and recommendations)

Cyclists are among our most vulnerable road users and are often cycling without protective or high visibility clothing etc.

The partnership engages and educates all road users, but especially the most vulnerable and this project would go some way to educate and help to make safe cyclists at some of the areas where collisions have regularly occurred with cyclists.

Hull City Council along with the local policing team and partnership have been engaging with cyclists at the junction of Mount Pleasant where red traffic light compliance has been poor. This will add to that education and engagement.

Partnership funds are expected to be very limited this year; however, this community project would be suitable for the PCC fund. If agreed in principle at the board, a decision record will be submitted to the OPCC with a view to fund.
